10-144 CMR 225 SECTION 6: DISPOSITION OF CREMATED REMAINS	A. The authorized person is responsible for the final arrangement of the cremated remains. Cremated remains must be deliver Crematorium Authority to the individual specified by the authorized person on the cremation authorization form. After this decremated remains may be transported in any manner authorized in the State of Maine, without a permit, and disposed of in account with the provisions of these Rules and 22 M.R.S.A. §§ 2843 and 2843-A. B. If the authorized person or a representative thereof has not received shipment of the cremated remains after a period of 30 the date of cremation, then the Crematorium Authority may dispose of the cremated remains in any manner permitted by lascattering, subject to Subsection C below. C. If the Crematorium Authority has reasonable grounds to believe that a funeral practitioner was associated with human remain the crematorium for more than 30 days, the Crematorium Authority should make every effort to return human remains to the practitioner. In the event that the cremated remains are returned to the funeral practitioner, the funeral practitioner must disponent in accordance with 22 M.R.S.A. §§ 2843, 2843-A, and 32 M.R.S.A. §§ 1405 and 1405-A.
